OECUMENIUS: (Revelation 22:17a) "And the Spirit," that is, the prophetic Spirit, "and the bride," the church that is universal and in every place, say, "Come!" We are instructed to seek the second coming of the Lord, and indeed to pray for it. For to be sure, whoever prays "thy kingdom come" to God seeks the kingdom of Christ, which is also the kingdom of the Father and of the Spirit. "And let him who hears say, 'Come,' " it says. Everyone who hears these words, even you, John, ought to pray for the kingdom of the coming of Christ. He says this to exhort everyone to the works and practices of righteousness. For no one who is not fully aware of righteousness in himself would pray for the coming of Christ, at which he will demand an

Read Obadiah & Jonah

THEODORET OF CYR: (Hosea 1:1-3) Likewise the Lord of all had bade Hosea also, therefore, marry a loose woman so as by the event to charge the people with impiety and give evidence of his characteristic longsuffering. If the God of all put up with the loose and adulterous synagogue, however, and the fount of holiness was not defiled by that loathsome and abominable thing, neither did the prophet incur any defilement from that licentious woman. Without being in thrall to lust, and instead carrying out a command from on high, he put up with that awful relationship. Now one must realize how judgment is made between good and bad by the purpose involved: on that basis marriage is distinguished from adultery, and though intercourse involves no difference, the difference emerges in the purpose and the law, and on the same basis what is lawful is distinguished from what is lawless. be troubled, for the Day of the Lord comes; for it is nigh at hand, a day of darkness and of gloominess, a day of cloud and whirlwind." For the Day of the Lord is great and very terrible, and who shall sustain it? But how incomprehensible and unimaginable that greatness with which he shall come in his second coming! In some degree we estimate correctly if we consider with heedful reflection the momentous circumstances of his first advent. Surely the Lord came to die, and the impoverishment and punishments of our flesh he underwent in his own body that he might redeem us from death. Before he came to the stock of the cross he suffered to be bound, to be spit on, to be mocked and to be beaten with blows on his cheek. Observe to what disgraceful treatment he consented to come for our sakes, and yet, before he permitted himself to be laid hold of, he questioned his persecutors, saying, "Whom do you seek?" To that they answered, "Jesus of Nazareth." And when he said to them directly, "I am he," he only uttered a voice of the mildest answer, and at once prostrated his armed persecutors to the earth. What then shall he do when he comes to judge the world, if by one utterance of his voice he struck down his enemies even when he came to be judged? What is that judgment which he exercises as immortal, that a single utterance of it could not be endured when he was about to die? Who may sustain his wrath when his very mildness even could not be sustained? So then, let the holy man

Wednesday, November 26

• Read Micah 1-3

ORIGEN: (Hosea 6:2) Hear what the prophet says: "God will revive us after two days, and on the third day we shall arise and live in his sight." The first day is the passion of the Savior for us. The second is the day on which he descended into hell. The third day is the day of resurrection. Therefore on the third day "God went before them, by day in a column of cloud, by night in a column of fire."9 But if according to what we said above, the apostle teaches us rightly that the mysteries of baptism are contained in these words, it is necessary that "those who are baptized in Christ are baptized in his death and are buried with him." [They must] also arise from the dead with him on the third day, according to what the apostle says, "He raised up together with him and at the same time made them sit in the heavenly places."12 When, therefore, you shall have undertaken the mystery of the third day, God will begin to lead you and will himself show you the way of salvation. Thursday, November 27

• Read Micah 4-7

TERTULLIAN: (Hosea 10:5-6) The Lord himself comes to a trial with "the elders and rulers of the people," as Isaiah predicted. And then he fulfilled all that had been written of his passion. At that time "the heathen raged, and the people imagined vain things; the kings of the earth set themselves, and the rulers gathered themselves together against the Lord and against his Christ." The heathen were Pilate and the Romans; the people were the tribes of Israel; the kings were represented in Herod and the rulers in the chief priests. When, indeed, he was sent to Herod gratuitously by Pilate, the words of Hosea were accomplished, for he had prophesied of Christ, "And they shall carry him bound as a present to the king." AGAINST MARCION $4.42.^{5}$

• Read Nahum

THEODORE OF MOPSUESTIA: (Hosea 14:9) You could really demonstrate that a wise and understanding person is the one with knowledge of what has been said and with zeal for the things by which it is

possible for people who avoid evil and zealously practice good to be established in freedom from lower things and in enjoyment of higher things. This is because everything done by God is marked by great correctness, with which he also applies punishment to the fallen and knows how to achieve their salvation when they repent. You could also demonstrate that the righteous are those of their number who also know how to profit from each category and who develop greater selfcontrol from the punishments, on the one hand, while taking the enjoyment of the good things stemming from repentance as a stimulus to virtue, on the other. You could also demonstrate that the impious are those who deserve troubles in every way and of every kind, gaining nothing from them, stuck fast in a downward direction, and as a result not able to understand anything of their duty. GREGORY THE GREAT: (Joel 2:1) The terror of the strict inquest, which Zephaniah calls "the trumpet," blessed Job designates "thundering." Joel, also viewing it, says, "Let all the inhabitants of the land
